
From inspiration to implementation: An OER takes the stage

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Abstract

Graduate supervision profoundly impacts graduate student and faculty mental health and wellbeing. Tensions within supervisory relationships are further complicated by equity and inclusion related barriers that marginalized communities face within academia. To address this situation, we created *Rock the Boat*, an open access educational resource that uses Research-based Theatre to provoke dialogue about supervisory relationships. *Rock the Boat* is published through Pressbooks and includes four professionally acted scenes plus a facilitator's guide and supplementary resources. This poster illustrates the lifecycle of the project from its inception to the final stages of implementation, highlighting key milestones, challenges and outcomes at each stage of the OER development and implementation process.

Spring/Summer 2019

Research challenges in graduate supervisory relationships through extensive literature review & story sharing with graduate students, faculty, and staff; network with UBC stakeholders

Fall 2019

Rehearse and offer six live theatre performances of Don't Rock the Boat with facilitated small group discussions between each scene

Fall 2020

Work with playwright to create and film 3 additional scenes emphasizing EDI concerns & develop accompanying facilitator guide, piloting and assessing the impacts in a variety of contexts

Fall 2021-Fall 2023

Present resource widely through conferences (e.g., Canadian Association of Graduate Studies), curriculum retreats, meetings with Deans, credit and non-credit courses (SPPH 507/607; RHSC 530)

Winter 2024

Collaborate with colleagues in Faculty of Medicine to incorporate Rock the Boat as part of core curriculum of HEART. It is now used nationally and internationally, from course to system level and accessed in 20+ countries


